

Checking PDF files for integrity

Adobe Acrobat PDF files can be an effective way to send electronic layout files to your printer or other service providers. Acrobat files usually are small, portable, accurate, error-free, and most importantly, should contain all the fonts and other components of the pages you've carefully designed. But how closely the PDF file represents the original pages, and how well it outputs, depends on how you created the PDF file. Printers typically run

PDF files through a "preflight" process to check for output problems. It will save time, money, and frustration for both you and your print partner if you identify problems before you submit your files.

Preflight Online at www.creativepro.com is a free online service that allows you to upload multiple PDF files, preflight them, and receive a detailed report of any problems in the PDF files. If the files are good to go, Preflight Online will "package"

the files together into one compressed file ready to send to your service provider.

Preflight Pro (www.extensis.com), Instant PDF (www.enfocus.com), and FlightCheck Collect (www.markzware.com) are software programs for Windows or Macintosh that preflight and package PDF files. These programs are more expensive and complicated than the Preflight Online service, and offer many more capabilities.
